

Cumberland Valley Christian School's campus was alive with energy and enthusiasm on Friday, May 2nd, as students took part in this year's Race for Education, an annual tradition that blends fitness, fun, and fundraising for a great cause. With bright skies and brighter smiles, students from all grade levels ran laps around the CVCS soccer field, supported by families, teachers, and staff.

In the weeks leading up to the race, students gathered sponsor donations from friends, family members, and local supporters, all with the shared goal of raising funds to support tuition assistance for CVCS families. The response was overwhelming: \$50,000 was raised, far exceeding the school's original goal of \$29,000.

CVCS awarded diplomas to 17 members of the Class of 2025 during the graduation ceremony in the Open Door Church auditorium on May 30.

- Hott was also valedictorian and in his valedictory address said, "At the Cumberland Valley Christian School we are pushed to think critically, to write clearly, and frankly to survive on little sleep. More importantly, we learned how to listen, how to lead, how to push through the hard times, and how to be disciples to God and defend our faith."
- Avery Royer was the salutatorian, and he told his classmates: "We have all sprouted, but this is only a chapter. Today isn't about staring backwards, it's about recognizing where we came from and moving ahead. The future is scary. Life can seem scary, but that's the beauty of it."
- Knight also offered this advice: "Keep God first. Be kind to everyone. So many opportunities are missed because of being unkind to others. You never know who that person is or will become."
- CVCS seniors have earned more than \$230,000 in scholarships.
- Eleven seniors have earned college credits, led by Emma Gardner with 27, Jacob Hughes with 22, Landon Kellogg and Nathan Minnier with 21 each, and Gage Brookens with 18.
- For their class gift, the senior class is presenting new practice balls for the varsity soccer team and needed fixtures and items in the preschool.
- CVCS graduated one international student, Nian-Yu "Nelly" Wu, whose parents and other family members traveled all the way from Taiwan to be here for the graduation.

- Enhance the overall school experience and serve as a point of pride for alumni and supporters


