


CONGRESSMAN JOHN JOYCE

As a prelude to the CVCS 50th anniversary celebration, Congressman John Joyce visited the school on Oct. 9. Dr. Joyce spoke to an assembly of 7th through 12th grade students and visited the 5th-grade classroom.

Dr. Joyce, an Altoona native, represents Pennsylvania's 13th Congressional District in the United States House of Representatives. He has been in Congress since 2019, and he was reelected for his fourth term this past November.





Dr. Joyce talked with students and staff about a variety of subjects, including school choice: "I believe in school choice, that parents should have the right to choose what kind of education their children should receive."

He said he had acknowledged CVCS on the House floor for its 50 years of "offering quality faith-based education." He presented the school with a flag that had flown over the U.S. Capitol Building.

Dr. Joyce fielded questions from students. In response to one student he said, "The American Dream is what you want to be based on your God-given talents and abilities."




GRANDPARENTS DAY

CVCS basketball teams are hoping for success in postseason play.

At time of publication, the varsity girls team had a record of 8-7 and is a legitimate contender for a championship in the Mason Dixon Christian Conference tournament. The Blazers' most impressive victory was a 20-point win over Grace Academy.

The varsity boys are hoping for a Final Four appearance in the MDCC tournament. At publication time, their record was 3-12 with some very winnable games coming up.

PENNY DRIVE

CVCS students raised more than \$3,400 in a "Penny Drive" to help orphans in Uganda.

Student council advisor Amanda Carey formulated the idea after hearing about a pastor in Uganda who was given charge to care for 116 orphans who were living without basic necessities of food, clean water, clothing and medical care.

She initiated a drive in which students would donate pennies as part of a class competition and would accumulate points based on the number of pennies collected. Students could also donate larger denominations of coins or bills to reduce other classes' point totals.

"As a teacher, I knew that our students would love the competition of such a fundraiser and would always enjoy the opportunity to bless those in need," Mrs. Carey said. "The Student Council discussed how we would like to run things to make them a little bit more interesting (i.e., using silver coins as sabotage), and we set the initial goal of \$1,000. Never in my wildest dreams could I have imagined the outcome."
