- Overhead Upgrades Underway We're in the process of installing a new HVAC system, improving air circulation, and climate control for athletes and spectators alike.
- **Ceiling & Wall Refresh** The ceiling and walls are being freshly painted to brighten and modernize the space.

CVCS sports teams have had some struggles during the fall season, but the key theme mentioned by coaches has been growth.

"This season has been about growth," soccer coach Stan Hott said. "With so many new players, it's been encouraging to see our returning leaders — seniors Titus Hott, A.J. Sloan and Quinten Cooper — set the tone and show the younger guys what it means to lead both on and off the pitch. We're building something strong together."
